LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

On an extremely hot weekend in July, 42 of our Year 10 students completed a weekend expedition to the Peak District as part of their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award.

The Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award is designed for young people aged 14 and above. Completing the Bronze Award typically takes a minimum of six months and requires dedication and commitment. At LVC, we run our own assessment of the Award, providing coaching, leadership and verification of the qualification.



The scheme has been run at LVC by Mr Barton for the past 15 years and hundreds of our students have benefited from taking part. We are proud that nearly a third of our Year 10 cohort are registered for the programme. It offers an important opportunity for personal development and community involvement through four components: volunteering, physical recreation, skills and an expedition.

Volunteering involves participants engaging in community service activities, fostering a sense of responsibility and empathy. This could range from helping at local charities to participating in local conservation projects.

Physical recreation aims to improve health and fitness and the skills element focuses on developing new talents or honing existing ones. This is about exploring interests and passions, whether it is learning a musical instrument, cooking or even coding.

Our trip to the Peak District for the expedition is perhaps the most exciting part of the Bronze Award. Participants plan, train for and undertake this journey in a group. This section is designed to build teamwork, resilience and a sense of adventure. Our students went on two day-long hikes and then spent the nights camping and cooking their own food.

We have recently been awarded a certificate from the scheme praising the 429 voluntary hours that our students have given to the local community this year. Well done to all of you!

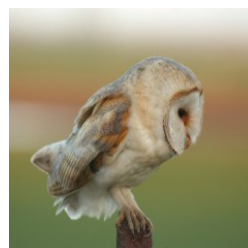

### **New NSIP solar initiative**

KSCA is set to join a new initiative, **Stop Oversized Solar (SOS)**, alongside other groups campaigning against large-scale solar projects that fall under the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) planning rules. The initiative aims to meet parliamentarians in July to highlight concerns about industrial-scale solar developments. We've contacted Pippa Heylings to urge her to take part.

### **Step into Nature: Bats and owls matter**

As part of our *Step into Nature* campaign, we're shifting focus from July's Bug Hunt to bats and owls this August. Our local area is home to a rich bat population, including the rare and protected Western Barbastelle. We also have a healthy population of tawny owls and barn owls in the area.



Interestingly, Kingsway's surveys haven't recorded any

owl activity so far, making your observations even more important.

Please log any sightings on iRecord to build a clearer picture. Even if you're unsure of the species of bat, all records are useful. 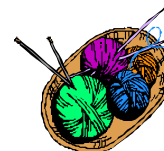

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## **AUGUST UPDATE FROM CHARLOTTE CANE MP**

It's been a year since I was elected to represent Ely and East Cambridgeshire, and I'm proud of what we've achieved together so far. From tackling local issues to standing up for our community in Westminster, I've been working hard to deliver real change.

### **Key priorities this year have included:**

- Supporting residents through the cost-of-living crisis.
- Campaigning for better access to NHS dentists.
- Demanding action on sewage pollution in our rivers.
- Pushing for more resources to tackle rural crime.

I'm also continuing to fight for fairer funding for Cambridgeshire councils, especially for SEND services and road maintenance. And I remain committed to securing investment in the Ely Junction rail upgrade — a vital project for our region's growth.

### **Standing Up for Fairness:**

I voted against the Government's Welfare Bill, which would have cut vital support for carers and vulnerable people. I'll keep campaigning for a fair, compassionate welfare system that protects dignity and independence.

### **Backing Local Pharmacies:**

Rural and community pharmacies are under pressure. I've urged the Health Minister to ensure they receive the funding and staffing they need to continue delivering essential services.

### **Listening to Farmers:**

After meeting local farmers at an NFU event, I raised their concerns — including hare coursing and machinery theft — with the Policing Minister, and discussed how the rural crime strategy can better support our communities.

### **SEND Reform:**

Many parents have shared their concerns about the Government's proposed Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) reforms. I'm backing the Liberal Democrats' five principles for reform, which focus on putting children and families first, boosting capacity, and ensuring fair funding.

### **At home in the Constituency:**

With Parliament in recess, I'm enjoying attending events across our beautiful area — like Burwell Carnival, where I got to sit in Burwell Print's "Formula 1" car! Community events are a lovely way for me to meet residents and hear your concerns.

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ECDC COUNCILLOR'S REPORTS

County Councillor for the Woodditton division

Local government reorganisation

Proposals for new 'unitary' councils to replace our existing county and district councils have been narrowed down to three options. All three divide Cambridgeshire & Peterborough into just two councils, as follows.

Option A

- Cambridge City, East Cambridgeshire and South Cambridgeshire
- Fenland, Huntingdonshire and Peterborough

Option B

- Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire
- East Cambridgeshire, Fenland, Huntingdonshire and Peterborough

Option C

- Cambridge City, Huntingdonshire, and South Cambridgeshire
- East Cambridgeshire, Fenland and Peterborough

Option A is the only one retaining links with Cambridge, where a huge proportion of our residents' work, study, obtain health care, and travel for leisure and entertainment.

I've been encouraging all Parish councils to give their voice to these proposals on your behalf. I'll make sure more opportunities to do so reach the wider community before the end of November when existing Cambridgeshire & Peterborough councils write to Government, who will ultimately decide to choose or amend any of the above proposals or even substitute them with a proposal of their own.

Council recognised for climate leadership

Cambridgeshire County Council has been ranked as one of the top-performing councils in the country for the action it has taken towards Net Zero. The Climate Action Scorecards published by Climate Emergency UK, placed Cambridgeshire second among all comparable local authorities in England. It was also one of the most improved.

The Scorecard assesses more than 400 councils and combined authorities against a broad range of climate criteria, including transport, buildings and heating, biodiversity, planning, governance, waste, and community engagement.

Highways

I'm sure many will have seen the newly laid road past Stetchworth Hall Farm up to the July Course. This road was always planned to be relaid this year but was brought forward due to irreparable heat damage making it unsafe.

Further good news is that following further inspection the road between The King's Head and Eagle Lane, it will now be relaid in the autumn rather than next year. It was accepted the original planned method was

no longer viable due to the rate of deterioration of the road.

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## **DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORTS**

### **Bottisham Ward**

A very busy month for committees

#### **Licensing Committee 18 June**

The draft revised version of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy (which must be reviewed every five years) was approved, and is now going out to consultation. The major change was the Promotion of Equality, in a paragraph introduced to set out the Council's commitment to equality matters.

#### **Operational Services Committee 23 June**

i. Proposed changes to planning committees by central government were considered to be not helpful, and the Council has formed a small group that will respond to the consultation and potential changes.

ii. It was resolved to note the content of the report, and the progress made towards the implementation of the new waste and recycling collection service.

iii. The Citizens Advice West Suffolk (CAWS) report was noted, and it showed that many residents of the Bottisham Ward were using this service.

#### **Finance and Assets Committee 26 June**

i. The Climate and Nature Monitoring Report mentioned that progress was being made in some of the items in the Action Plan, but that many had not been started. The Council was encouraging households to improve energy efficiency through ECO 4 and a more flexible arrangement agreed with contractors. Mention was made of working with residents to create an accessible one-acre woodland in Bottisham.

ii. A sum of £102,245 has been set aside towards Inclusive Play and Open Spaces improvements and creation following the Inclusive Play Audit.

iii. The Council was given grants from UK Shared Prosperity and Rural England Prosperity Business Grant Funds to help small businesses expand and train new staff. It was agreed that the Business Growth Fund will open on the 7 July 2025 and close no later than 23:59 on 5 September 2025, with all projects to be completed by 31 March 2026, and that the Rural England Prosperity Business grant fund will open early autumn 2025 and be completed by 31st March 2026. Further details from the Economic Development Manager at ECDC. Parish Councils will be notified as they may be aware of small businesses in their patch that would qualify for these grants.

#### **Surgery**

There will be no surgery this month, and we shall resume holding surgeries in September.

Highways

Residents will be aware of the resurfacing of Bradley Road to the County Boundary that was in the Capital programme, that I voted for back in March 2025.

There is still some renewal of signage at Burrough Green Primary, which is due in this financial year.

If there is any work that you believe requires work, please contact me and I will raise this with Highways and try to get it done.

Council Reorganisation

The response to the Government's imposed Council reorganisation continues to develop.

The three options being considered that I mentioned last month continue to be worked on, although there is an additional option being pushed by Labour MPs close to Peterborough, namely what is effectively a Greater Peterborough proposal. This would involve the current Peterborough Unitary authority together with the northern parts of Fenland and Huntingdonshire. The remainder of Cambridgeshire would form a southern unitary authority.

Option 1 splits the area, west and east, with Huntingdonshire, South Cambs and Cambridge City in the west and Peterborough, Fenland and East Cambridgeshire in the East.

Option 2 has South Cambs and Cambridge City together, with Peterborough, Huntingdonshire, Fenland and East Cambridgeshire as the other unitary. Option 3 has the area split north/ south, with Peterborough, Fenland and Hunts in the North and South Cambs, Cambridge City and East Cambs in the south.

The response to Government stating that the final decision from the councils is required by 28th November and there is still a lot of difference of opinion on the preferred model.

A lot of the work being done is not around the best geographical fit, but financial and operational considerations, due to the heavy debts that some Councils have.

East Cambridgeshire District Council has no external borrowing and pride itself on strong financial management.

I am the Chairman of the Finance & Assets Committee at East Cambs, so know how vital looking after your money is to residents. In my opinion, whilst geographically it looks sensible, Option 3 would put East Cambs in with a debt-ridden Cambridge City, as well as South Cambs, who have a 4 day week policy, where staff are paid for a full week's work, but only work 4 days. That cannot be a good use of your money. Indeed, only last week the Lib Dem controlled South Cambs Council debated the benefits of the 4-day week policy highlighting an "independent report" written by a supporter of such policies. Hardly Independent!

Whilst I agree that there was a need for a reorganisation, this has been imposed by Government

with little discussion and no opportunity for residents to comment.

I will continue to keep you updated, but welcome your feedback or comments.

If there is anything concerning you, please contact me. I am here to help on any matter over which you have concerns. I have not done surgeries previously, because I am able to visit residents or meet them, wherever is suitable for them, rather than making residents come to me. I am available to all.

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CAMBRIDGE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE

Stay fire safe while enjoying the summer weather!
Staying safe outside is just as important as keeping your family safe from fire in your home.

As the Summer weather hopefully continues and the school holidays arrive, many will take the opportunity to get out in the garden and give it a tidy. There are a few simple things to do which will help reduce the risk of having a fire:

- Dispose of garden waste using either a local waste pick up service, or take it to a local recycling centre. Do not light a bonfire!
- Ensure cigarettes are completely out
- Do not leave glass bottles lying on the ground - the sun's rays reflect through the glass and can start a fire.

If you are planning to have a BBQ:

- Use barbeques on a hard, flat surface away from grass, shrubs or fencing
- Put disposable barbeques on bricks, do not place directly on grass.

Don't be tempted to swim in open water!

When the weather is hot and sunny it might tempt people into swimming in open water.

It might be nice and warm, but the water temperature can still be very cold, which could cause cold water shock making it difficult to swim to safety. The water might also be deeper than it looks, with hidden dangers under the surface.

We know water is tempting when it's warm outside and as friends gather looking for something to do it can seem great fun. But the fun can quickly turn to tragedy and that is what we are trying to prevent by ensuring everyone understands the risks and hidden dangers.

As much as we discourage people from doing so, we are aware that people will decide to swim in open water. If you get into difficulty, you should "Float to Live", by leaning back, using your arms and legs to stay afloat, and try and control your breathing. Once calm, either call for help or try and swim to safety.

Also a really useful tip to help pinpoint your location is giving us a what3words reference. This is easy to do by downloading the app before heading out and encouraging everyone in your group to do the same, making a note of where you're swimming. The app is free and available to download on any mobile device.
