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BURROUGH GREEN READING ROOM

It's both sad and strange to think that our beautiful village hall has been out of action now for over 6 months. Undoubtedly, we have missed a couple of breakfasts, coffee mornings, afternoon teas and private parties during this time - but behind the closed doors many changes have happened.

We were awarded a substantial grant from Amey Cespa and have used this money to vastly improve the heating in the hall. We now have a state-of-the-art, air sourced heating and air conditioning system and have installed secondary glazing - the difference is huge - the hall is really cosy and the glazing has also reduced a lot of the noise from the road.

But we haven't stopped there! We know that lighting is very important to create the right atmosphere, so we have installed modern, adjustable uplighters. Together with redecoration of the walls and ceiling the Reading Room is looking very smart indeed.

We have other projects in the pipeline including improvements to the flooring, new seating and some landscaping to the area outside the hall.

All this has been possible due to the goodwill and hard work of our small committee and through donations from local residents, charities and the Parish Council.

I am extremely grateful to everyone who has contributed to keeping our community hall alive during this time of hibernation.

We cannot wait to show off our Reading Room and welcome people back to enjoy our new facilities as soon as we can. When the time is right we will. Until then, stay safe.

**KEITH AND MAUREEN LORD - A TRIBUTE**

Three weeks ago Willingham Green lost its oldest resident. Keith and Maureen Lord had lived for over 50 years on Willingham Green Road, amongst their geese, chickens, rabbits and sheep and lambs. Keith died sitting in his chair by the kitchen range where he was always to be found when he wasn't out and about caring for his livestock. He was well into his eighties.

This magazine, The Village Voice had been important to them. For many years I have delivered it, not daring to be late as Maureen eagerly waited. It seemed to connect them in a symbolic way with the very heart of our community. And it was there that they belonged and still do, in the affections of the many local people whose lives they touched. In later years their neighbour Di gave them constant and caring support, as did their daughter Rachel, son in law James and their two grandchildren.

Maureen was a skilled and professional tailor. Many of us were grateful to her for the swift and beautiful job she would do on garment alterations. Her laughter, her sense of fun and love of a good chat would be my reward for dropping in with The Village Voice each month. She told me that in her younger days she had worked as a milliner in Cambridge. Maureen died in May this year. She had been in hospital and care home since January. Keith was not allowed to see her because her ward was closed to visitors and then came the Virus. It broke his heart, as it did ours who watched his plight, and it must have been terrible for Maureen during those many months of separation from the life she knew and all she loved.

Keith, despite his poor health in recent times, was always on the move. No matter what weather, on the coldest, wettest days he was a constant presence on our roads in his little truck or car visiting his flocks of sheep billeted in paddocks and pastures around the neighbourhood. Keith as a shepherd was sometimes referred to locally as "Keith Lord is my Shepherd". Quietly and without any fuss he went about his business feeding and checking on his sheep and lambs. He said little, but he was so much part of our countryside and its ways, and in his style of life he was a connection with a past era of smallholders who knew nature intimately.

Keith has joined Maureen in another place, and it's as though the animals that surrounded them have left to accompany them too. The silence on Willingham Green road is painful - no geese, no cockerel, no sheep and lambs. Although a chapter from rural life is now over many of us will remember Maureen and Keith with affection, admiration and gratitude.

## **CAMBRIDGE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE**

### **Getting ready for winter**

As the colder months draw in, we begin using our fires, burners and chimneys once again to warm our homes. Chimney Fires continue to be a common occurrence in home fires in the winter months. To ensure you keep your home safe from fire, follow our top tips below:

- Whatever fire you have or fuel you burn it is vitally important to have your chimney swept to avoid a build-up of ash and soot.
- Avoid burning resinous woods (that quickly build up soot).
- Only burn fuels suitable for your burner (eg. never burn anything other than wood in a wood burner).
- Do not overload the grate/ appliance.
- Do not bank fires too high and remember to let them burn out well before you go to bed.
- Check the hearth, floor and furnishings near the fire for hot sparks/embers.
- Do not place objects on or over the mantelpiece which cause you to stand too close to the fire in order to reach them.
- Use a fire/spark guard to prevent accidental fires and make sure it has the kite mark or conforms to British/ European standards.
- Inspect your chimney breast, particularly the roof space. Make sure it is sound and sparks/fumes cannot escape through cracks or broken bricks.

Most importantly, always fit a smoke alarm and test your alarm weekly and ensure a Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarm is installed in the room where the burner is.

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is looking to recruit more on-call firefighters to help serve local communities across the county.

CFRS is looking for men and women from all backgrounds to become on-call firefighters and provide emergency cover from either their home or their workplace.

On-call firefighters are a vital part of our Service and community. They respond to a wide range of incidents, from fighting fires, attending road traffic collisions, animal rescues to supporting other emergency services. In addition to responding to emergency incidents, our on-call firefighters support their communities by providing information and advice on a range of community safety topics.

They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

It's a hugely rewarding role, and we hope to encourage members of the community from all backgrounds to get in touch and find out more about becoming an on-call firefighter.

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**MARSH MAIL**

In the last month we have welcomed our newest cohort of LVC students as well as enjoying the reunion with Years 8-11 who haven't attended school in person since March. Hearing the buildings alive again with the sound of students learning has been brilliant.

Our system of controls to enable a full reopening has involved lots of changes to the way the College operates. The students and staff have done an amazing job of rising to the challenge of this new way of schooling and acclimatising to different routines.

Despite all that has changed at Linton Village College, there is still plenty that is reassuringly familiar. While teachers now move around the site between lessons, the joy of observing students learning and acquiring new knowledge and skills remains. School systems may be unrecognisable with staggered timetables, year group zones and many other logistical adjustments, but the interactions between students and staff and the College's relational approach continues to make LVC a special place to learn and work.

Aspects of our community provision have also reopened this month. The youngest site users have returned to Linton Granta Playgroup and Linton Out of School Club with Covid-19 risk assessments and adjustments in place. Both facilities provide important childcare for local families. Our Community Sports Centre has also seen an increasing usage since it reopened with Covid-19 restrictions in place, with many local clubs restarting.

Unfortunately, it has not yet been possible to reinstate all community activities yet. The enhanced cleaning requirements and the need to ensure that year group zones are not compromised means that our Adult Education programme has been cancelled this term. Lettings and other extra-curricular activities have also needed to be put on hold while we focus on ensuring the safe and effective delivery of our core educational provision.

We will continue to review this position and hope to be able to recommence evening classes at some stage in the New Year, depending on the Covid-19 context.

The support and understanding of our parents and wider members of the College community at this exceptional time has been very much appreciated.

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DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORTS

from Charlotte Cane and John Trapp

Not much activity at the Council and the District the last month

1. There is quite a bit of resentment from residents, particularly in and around Ely, about the possible closure of the Mepal Outdoor Centre, and to replace it by a crematorium. Many residents have pointed out that, were there a need for an additional crematorium, having it at almost the northern boundary of the district doesn't help those in the south, and that the outdoor centre, if properly managed, would be a real asset to the district.

Apparently the administration has been considering closing the Outdoor Centre for over 18 months, which is when consultants had been first engaged in secret.

2. The questionnaire for the Bus, Cycle and Footpath survey has not yet been analysed, and the working group has not met for some time.
3. We are continuing with surgeries, but still cannot hold them face-to-face, and so they will be by telephone to either of us (07976 607512 for Charlotte, and 07942 685599 for John. The next one is on Wednesday 28 October at six o'clock, followed by a Zoom meeting (send an email to john.trapp@eastcambs.gov.uk to obtain the sign in details) at seven o'clock. ### **A1307 Update**

The work on the A1307 is continuing, with the next updates to our stretch of the road being average speed cameras installed between Haverhill and Linton. Going through the processes is a new roundabout at the Bartlow Road, Linton junction of the A1307 and a remodelling of the Dean Road crossing on the dual carriageway.

There have been workshops over July and August looking at specific schemes on the A1307. The schemes that drew the most concern were the proposed westbound bus lane at Linton and the loss of the rural 'hub' at Linton, but there is a slim chance this could be looked at later down the line.

### **Experimental Traffic Orders**

The County Council, acting on government legislation, has started implementing some temporary traffic regulation orders around the county. The first few are only in Cambridge city at the moment and are designed, whilst the roads are supposedly quieter, to close some roads to vehicles (bar emergency services) to encourage non-motorised travel. There is talk of trialing some in rural areas, but nothing concrete yet.

### **Self-employed Support**

The government has announced that the self-employed can claim an additional payment from them. Info can be found on the government's website or Geoff can assist via the District Council.

### **Zero Carbon Communities Grant**

Round 2 of the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities Grant is now open. This year the grant is focussing on three main themes - cycling, community buildings and tree planting & other nature-based initiatives. Applications are invited from parish councils and community groups. The total available is £100,000 with individual grants of £1,000 - £15,000. The scheme opened on Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> July and the application deadline is 5pm Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> September.

### **Electoral Register**

The District Council is doing its annual canvas to get the electoral register up to date. Please do encourage anyone that you know isn't registered to do so and follow the steps laid out in the letters that SCDC are sending out.

### **Devolution**

There is some talk within central government that they are leaning towards more unitary authorities in the country, so fewer layers of local government and just one authority that deals with everything. This is the current setup in Peterborough. This will be a constantly moving animal, so keep your ears to the ground.

### **Fostering**

The County Council are constantly on the hunt for more foster carers. They are having a big drive and are holding various events around Cambridgeshire to promote this. Time

October feels different this year, well most things do! The month brings with it the changing of the clocks, and the transient pleasure of a lie-in for late risers, but also the reality of the night's drawing in.

There is a certain strangeness about human ability to alter and control time. This year time took on a somewhat surreal quality, usual lines and rhythms seemed blurred.

Time is defined as 'the indefinite continued progress of existence and events that occur in an apparently irreversible succession from the past, through the present, into the future.' From human perspective, time is linear and goes in one direction. Although many writers have delighted in exploring the wonders and dangers of time travel. I wonder if we could time travel in any direction what year or time we might like to visit or revisit?

What about for God? How does God negotiate time? God is mostly understood to stand outside of time. There was never a time when God wasn't, and there will never be a time when God isn't. But even though God exists outside time, and is not subject to it, God reveals Godself within time, because humanity and creation is within it. Then at a very specific point in time God in Jesus entered into the human timeline. The ancient Greeks had two words for time: *chronos*

referring to sequential time, and *kairos* which signifies a 'perfect' moment in time. Somehow, when Jesus entered *chronos*, it was also *kairos*. God came to be in the world as well as outside of the world. Suddenly altering time for an hour or so seems somewhat easy!

May you enjoy your 'new' hour and know God's presence with you, in any and all uncertainty.
