New Year's Eve - A special menu for the evening, in a similar style to our usual offering, we will be open until 01:00, with last orders at 00:30.


Burger Night - date tbc, towards the latter half of January - please keep an eye on socials or give us a call in the New Year for more details!

KINGSWAY SOLAR COMMUNITY ACTION: THE WORK GOES ON

It's been a busy month for the Kingsway Solar Community Action (KSCA) group. We hope you've spotted some of us at the public consultations or come across our leaflets. Most importantly, we hope you've submitted your responses to Kingsway. Your opinion matters!

But our work doesn't end here. At the Extraordinary Parish Meeting on Thursday 5th December, at the Balsham Institute, local parish councils came together to discuss working collaboratively on the solar farm development. The meeting was well attended and included a presentation via weblink from Dr Catherine Judkins from Say No to Sunnica group, the Town and Parish Council Alliance and UK Solar Alliance.

In sharing her experiences with the room, she described the five-year process for the Sunnica solar farm. She emphasized the importance of persistence, saying "You do need to stick with it and work through it, because it is a process that you do need to engage with" and added, "Think of it as working in waves—some periods will need more engagement than others." At the meeting, KSCA emphasized the need for strong representation, saying, "We need voices who can negotiate on behalf of the communities to achieve the best outcome."

We met with Pippa Heylings, MP, who is pushing for a Land Use Framework to improve decision-making on large-scale solar projects. The meeting included a good mix of people from KSCA, the Parish Councils, and the District Council, showing how we're working together.

KSCA also met with David Vernon from Kingsway to discuss our concerns and objections to the solar farm (more details to follow). As we move forward, we'll need to involve experts, from ecologists to lawyers, to ensure we have strong evidence and representation.

UPDATE FROM BURROUGH GREEN PARISH COUNCIL

Thank you to those who joined our November meeting. Here are the highlights and recent updates:

<u>Speeding</u> - We've very pleased to let you know that our application for grant funding from the Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund has been successful. The money will be used to cover the cost of installing a dedicated MVAS (Mobile Vehicle Activate Sign) on Brinkley Road in Burrough End.

<u>Village Pond</u> - The final phase of the refurbishment will start soon but will take a few months to complete. We're planning to install a fence at the edge nearest the cricket pavilion, to prevent access and protect a small patch of land for wildlife. We're also looking at adding a hedgehog house and some new plants.

<u>School Update</u> - The Head Teacher joined the meeting to provide an update on many of exciting new things that have been happening recently, as well as some of the plans for the near future at Burrough Green C of E Primary Academy.

CHARLOTTE CANE MP - NEWSLETTER

As Christmas approaches, it has been a season of celebration and hard work, with a busy schedule in Westminster and across our constituency.

One recent highlight was visiting the Repair Café at Littleport Village Hall. This inspiring initiative brings people together to fix household items, share skills, and reduce waste. It was heartening to see the dedication of volunteers who give their time and expertise to support others. Projects like this not only foster community spirit but also champion sustainability, reminding us of the practical ways we can care for our environment while connecting with one another.

Amid these uplifting moments, my work continues to focus on issues affecting our area. Rising employer National Insurance contributions have been a recurring theme in discussions with local businesses. I recently met GPs at Staploe Medical Centre to hear how these costs are straining surgeries, and I welcomed East Cambridgeshire farmers to Parliament to discuss their impact on agriculture. Supporting those who provide healthcare and food is vital for our community's future.

Agriculture, the backbone of our local economy, has been a focus. Joining the 'Traditional Fenland Celery' harvest near Ely and visiting a sugar beet farm in Stetchworth underscored the dedication of our farmers. They face mounting challenges, and I remain committed to advocating for the support they need to thrive.

Infrastructure is another priority. The Ely Area Capacity Enhancement scheme (the proposal to upgrade the railway to allow more trains to run through Ely) is crucial for our region's future, promising growth and improved connectivity. Its omission from the Autumn Budget was disappointing, but I've raised the issue directly with the Secretary of State for Transport and will continue to push for action.

In Parliament, I faced one of my most difficult decisions: how to vote on the Assisted Dying Bill. After listening to all sides and reflecting deeply, I chose to support it at its second reading. This decision was not taken lightly, and I will continue to engage with constituents and experts as the bill progresses.

Closer to home, concerns about shoplifting have been prominent in conversations with shopworkers across East Cambridgeshire. I've urged the government to provide our overstretched police with the resources they need. Meanwhile, the ever-present flood risk in our region requires urgent, long-term planning, which I emphasised in a recent parliamentary debate.

It's been a pleasure meeting so many local residents. Opening The Edmund Trust's new respite service in Milton was a particularly meaningful moment, and thanking our hardworking posties at the Royal Mail delivery office in Ely was another highlight.

Education is the foundation of a healthy democracy, and my visits to Bottisham Village College and Robert Arkenstall Primary School in Haddenham offered an inspiring glimpse of the creativity and ambition shaping our future.

<u>DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT TO PARISH</u> COUNCILS

Operational Services Committee 18th November Nothing much to report from this committee:

- 1. The collection of waste and re-cycling is improving, but still not quite on target.
- 2. Street cleansing is efficient, but there was no data on how many streets have been cleaned.
- 3. An operating deficit of approximately £325,000 partly due to lower numbers of planning applications and building inspections.
- 4. The Air Quality Strategy plan for the District was presented; mostly aspirational, and few concrete strategies for improving air quality. Perhaps the new Local Plan can incorporate some measures (e.g. no chimneys in new buildings) to improve air quality.

Finance & Assets Committee 28th November This was also light on startling items:

- 1. The annual review of the Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme (LCTRS) for the 2025/26 year is to be unchanged for next year. LCTRS is for those residents who are on Universal Credit and Council Tax support. John argued that the Local Council Tax should be reduced to zero and not 8.5% as it is now, to help households struggling with the cost-of-living crisis, but the Administration thought that all households should pay even a minimum sum.
- 2. Changes to the exemption from Council Tax for second houses that are empty and for sale or under probate was extended from one to two years which seemed to favour those who had second dwellings or were landlords.
- 3. That this Committee has a projected year-end underspend of £746,000 when compared to its approved revenue budget of £7,016,768. Some of this underspend occurs because vacant posts are not filled quickly.
- 4. Water fountains had been installed in the public conveniences in Ely and that this would be extended to other public conveniences in the District.

Extraordinary Council on 11th December

The Independent on the Council has formed a group with the Lib Dems, so that this new group and the Conservative group have an equal number of members. According to the Local Government and Housing Act 1989, there needs to be equal representation on each

of the committees, and this will be resolved at this Council meeting.
