BURROUGH GREEN SCHOOL NEWS

Hello everyone. This is my final submission of this academic year. It has been an amazing journey for



myself. Last September, I was a new head teacher eager for the challenge and now I have almost completed my first year. The school has definitely moved forwards and many things have changed. The one constant though has been the incredible children that come to Burrough Green - from Day 1, they have been simply amazing.

One of the advantages of a small school is the family feel an environment like this creates. Nurtured properly, it can lead to heightened moral structures and increased acceptance of others. I have to say, the children here display these qualities in abundance and I am so proud to be leading here.

QuadKids - Athletics event

Earlier this month, I had the pleasure of taking 10 students to Cambridge University Sports Ground. They had the experience of running on a real running track. All children had to compete in 4 events - 75m, 600m (a horrible distance - no one was sure whether to sprint or pace themselves), standing long jump and turbo howler. 4 of our Year 6 girls (Lottie, Sienna, Emily and Minny) won their 75m races.

Some of the times some of the Year 6 boys from other schools were recording for the 600m were of a very high standard - I heard at least 2 posting times well below 1minute 50 seconds. Amazing standard of athletics all round!

Overall Burrough Green came 12th out of 20 schools – a remarkable achievement considering our numbers. Mrs Harrison and I were really proud of them all.

Governors

The school governors met on the 10-06-24 and they wish to share the following points:

- Governors were proud to hear that pupils were well-prepared for their SATS exams and applied themselves admirably throughout;
- Governors are delighted that the swimming pool is now open and being used by the Owls after-school club as well as for lessons during the day;
- Governors were pleased to see David Sandford open the recent Burrough Green Garden Fete, further strengthening the links with the local community;
- Governors have arranged their monitoring visits for the rest of the term and are looking forward to deep dives into Geography, DT and Music;

• Governors will soon be undertaking an annual Skills Audit as part of the regular assessment of the effectiveness of the Board. Our governors meet 3 times a term and they ensure the smooth running of the school. Their work is invaluable. Thank you.

Linton Village College

I have some wonderful news to share with our local community. Linton Village College has achieved a welldeserved 'good' rating in its most recent OFSTED report (April 2024). This is great for our school community.

As an aside, I have to say the transition work the school does with Year 6 moving into year 7 is excellent. Below is a link to the OFSTED report.

We encourage you to review this guide and talk to your children about safety precautions they can take in various situations. By staying informed and vigilant, we can work together to ensure the safety and well-being of all our students at all times of the day.

Felixstowe Trip

On Wednesday 12thJune, we went to Felixstowe to study Geography. Teachers had amazing activities lined up for the children and the trip was a massive success. The A14 behaved itself and the children loved going over the Orwell Bridge.

The quality of geography completed was first class – and as geography lead in the school, I was super impressed with everyone's work. Children were conducting surveys, being cartographers, understanding longshore drift and how humans control the coastline, erosion and looking at various other human and physical features. Year 6 met Suffolk Sounds – an internet radio station who gave us a 'shout out'!

Our aim is to visit Felixstowe every 2 years (as the plans on the website indicate) and use Felixstowe as a base to teach fieldwork. Research from the Geographical Association shows that becoming familiar with 1 or 2 places (our other venue will be Wicken Fen) gives the children a much better grounding in practical geography and they will be much more likely to understand this important element when asked to apply these skills to other places around the world in high school and beyond!

We still have awards ceremonies, sports days, leavers' assemblies, swimming (in our own pool!) and many other things to fit in before the end of term. It will be a super busy time for all staff.

I will write again in the October issue (I will be on holiday during August, so will miss the September submission date)

It just leaves me a final opportunity to say have a great summer everyone, enjoy as many experiences as possible and have fun. Take care and 'Come on England' (were still in the Euros and the 20/20 Cricket World Cup at time of writing!)

Additionally, we are excited to introduce Alex Monks as a new councillor. We are confident that Alex's contributions will greatly benefit our Parish.



MARSH MAIL - News from Linton Village College

We were exceptionally proud this month to have been rated 'Good' in all areas in our latest Ofsted inspection. The inspection report captures our caring and inclusive ethos and our commitment to a holistic, enriching educational experience.

During my time as a leader at LVC, I have been unequivocal about the importance of developing well rounded young people that are able to play an active role in their learning, their lives and their communities. The impact that Covid had on the education and socialisation of our young people, makes it even more important that they are supported to foster the skills of compassion and empathy, as well as the confidence to achieve success as independent learners.

Hosting Michael Rosen at LVC in June was an amazing opportunity to launch our Creativity Week focus on the theme of 'footsteps' ahead of National Refugee Week. Michael Rosen led a two-hour session with our Year 7 students, sharing poetry about migration and listening to students' own poetry. He also watched students perform dance and music inspired by his poetry which will be included in an event at the Cambridge Corn Exchange at the end of the month.

Our heritage as a Village College reminds us of the commitment to life-long learning. It is great to see students each year benefit from the Henry Morris memorial fund which was established to support young people aged 13-19 in Cambridgeshire for 'projects with purpose'.

This year, Angelos in Year 9 was successful in being awarded money to embark on a six-month project to build a radio-controlled car, a task requiring skills in two fields: electronics and mechanical design, both invaluable for aspiring engineers. The electronics component ensures the car functions, while the design and manufacturing involve creating the car's mechanics, such as steering, gear ratios, and structure. The Henry Morris Award is now partially funding the purchase of a 3D printer to design and print the car's mechanical parts.

# DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORTS

### Bottisham Ward

The Council is running a campaign to support people suffering from domestic abuse. Their staff and Councillors have been trained so that they can help anyone who 'asks for Ani' find the help and support which they need. Unfortunately, there tends to be an uplift in domestic violence during major football tournaments. If you are aware of anyone who might need help, please direct them to the Police and the Council - there is help available for them.

The Operational Services Committee agreed the Council's Vulnerable community strategy. Charlotte asked why no formal assessment had been carried out of disabled parking spaces across the district, why restrictions on disabled spaces ceased in the evenings, and how disabled parking spaces were enforced answers were unavailable at the meeting. After the meeting the Council simply confirmed that it had not carried out a survey and that it accepted no responsibility for on-street parking.

The budget for the Health & Wellbeing strategy was confirmed to be just £5,000, and questions were asked whether this was sufficient for the actions in the strategy, and what the service could do with more money.

The ECTC business plan for 2024/5 was approved by a majority. Charlotte, John and colleagues voted against the plan but were defeated. The company is not delivering more than thirty per cent affordable housing, which is what is required of any commercial developer, and it is not delivering a surplus for the council.

Hedgehogs were chosen by public vote to have their own Supplementary Planning Document. This proposed policy contains a number of measures such as creating 'hedgehog highways' via gardens through simple measures such as small holes created at the bottom of fences. For larger developments, the policy seeks wider habitat creation suitable for hedgehogs.

The Council unanimously agreed a motion, proposed by Cllr Chika Akinwale, recognising the essential role of play in child development. The motion also highlighted the importance of creating opportunities for outdoor play that can be accessed by all children, including those with mobility disabilities, such as wheelchair users.

The council will now carry out an independent audit of all 27 playgrounds it maintains, which provide a range of facilities for toddlers, juniors and youths. It will also offer Parish Councils the chance to have their playgrounds audited.

Once complete, the council will develop an inclusive Playground Strategy which looks at what can be achieved in the short, medium and long term, explore possible funding opportunities and create a toolkit to help deliver improvements which will be made when the existing equipment needs replacing.

The council has also agreed to work closely with its planning department to encourage Inclusive Playgrounds into the planning and approval processes for new developments. It will also explore the feasibility of developing a planning policy, through the new Local Plan, to include a requirement to deliver Inclusive Playgrounds.

# Woodditton ward

Since I wrote last month, we have had the announcement of the General Election and meetings have been postponed or delayed, as decisions that could have an effect on the General Election outcome are delayed until afterwards.

### Highways

There is still a delay in getting things done on road maintenance and this impacts upon residents.

I have been continually pushing for a better response from the Local Highways teams and it seems that this has been recognised, as changes in management have been made and I am due to have a briefing on this in the next few days, at the time that I am writing this article, so I should be able to update residents next month.

There needs to be a better system of operating to get essential repairs identified and actioned.

### Education

Some residents may have seen a recent online article about the cost of taxis to transport children to school being £25m for the 2023/2024 financial year.

This is an astronomical cost and has risen by  $\pounds 8m$  from two years ago.

I raised the issue back in January 2024, at the time of the budget setting for 2024/2025 that the costs were spiralling and was told that plans were in place to reduce the costs. I stated at that time that the plans appeared to be very optimistic without any real substance.

In my role as co-chair of Governors at Bottisham Village College, we are taking a number of students from Cambridge City, because Cambridge secondary schools are full. With the current and proposed building in and around Cambridge, surely the logical solution is to extend existing schools or build a new one, so that students study closer to home.

The costs of taxis is on top of the normal contracted buses that we use to transport students from the villages to the secondary schools.

### Buses

There is still a lack of clarity over what routes the Combined Authority are able to fund with their 200% precept increase and by the time that you read this article, the Transport & Infrastructure Committee will have met, so I may be able to update with information from that Committee meeting. Since the last article, I have moved house within Stetchworth, one of the eleven villages that I represent, so life has been very hectic.

I am here to represent you, so if there are any issues that concern you, please contact me.

If I am not aware of an issue, I am not able to solve it.

# Saint Matthew Chapter 5 Sermon on the Mount
