

# CAMBRIDGE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE

We want everyone to enjoy the sunny weather safely this summer. High temperatures and dry areas of land can be perfect conditions for a fire to spread.

Something as simple as not stubbing a cigarette out properly, or using a disposable barbecue on grass, can start a fire that can get out of control quickly.

There are some simple steps we urge residents to take to help prevent an outdoor fire:

- 1. Use barbecues on a hard, flat surface, away from grass, shrubs or fencing.
- 2. Put disposable barbecues on bricks, do not place directly on grass.
- 3. Ensure cigarettes are completely out.
- 4. Do not throw cigarettes out of car windows onto grass verges or vegetation.
- 5. Do not leave glass bottles lying on the ground, the sun's rays reflect through the glass and can start a fire
- 6. Talk to your children about the dangers of starting a fire.

CFRS is looking for men and women from all backgrounds to become on-call firefighters and provide emergency cover from either their home or their workplace.

On-call firefighters are a vital part of our Service and community. They respond to a wide range of incidents, from fighting fires, attending road traffic collisions, animal rescues to supporting other emergency services. In addition to responding to emergency incidents, our on-call firefighters support their communities by providing information and advice on a range of community safety topics.

They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

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# BEING GREEN!

In the queue at the shop, the cashier told the older woman that plastic bags weren't good for the environment. The woman apologised to her and explained, "We didn't have the green thing back in my day."

That's right; they didn't have the green thing in her day.

In the kitchen, they blended and stirred by hand because they didn't have electric machines to do everything for you. When they packaged a fragile item to send through the post, they used scrunched up newspaper to cushion it, not polystyrene or plastic bubble wrap.

Back then, they didn't switch on the mower or fill it with petrol to cut the lawn. They used a push mower that ran on human power. They exercised by working so they didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity. But she's right; they didn't have the green thing back then.

They drank from a fountain when they were thirsty, instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time they had a drink of water. They refilled pens with ink, instead of buying a new pen, and they replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull. But they didn't have the green thing back then.

# DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORTS EAST CAMBS

At the Annual Council meeting, appointments on committees for the next year were confirmed. Alan Sharp was elected Chair, and Dan Schumann Vicechair, of Council. Charlotte and John remain on the Finance & Assets committee; Charlotte is a member of the newly formed Audit Committee and the Bus Working Group. John remains on the Planning Committee, and he is a new appointee on the Operational Services committee.

The government is not allowing English Councils to continue remote meetings, so we are returning to face-to-face meetings. Officers are currently looking at how to do this safely and it may be that some meetings are not held at the Council Offices because a larger venue is needed. Virtual meetings have had their challenges, but the great advantage was that many more residents were able to engage with debates than happens with face-to-face. The Government is consulting on allowing remote meetings, if you would like to express your views, the consultation is open until 17th June at -

The Council agreed to lend £390,000 to the East Cambs Community Land Trust (CLT) to allow them to buy and then sell shared ownership housing on the former MOD site at Ely. We were concerned about the terms on which the CLT would be offering these socalled affordable houses, because the houses would be sold at full market value, even though the CLT was buying them at a discount from the East Cambs Trading Company. The only affordable element was that the new owners would only part own the properties, with the CLT owning the rest; there would be rent paid on the non-owned share, as well as possible service charges, so we questioned whether there would be any saving for the owners after paying the extra charges. We were also concerned about the security of the loan, as with the other lender the total loans would be 114% of the value of the CLT's share of the equity, against which the loans are secured.

East Cambs CLT's only members are the 5 Trustees, 2 of whom are District Councillors, appointed by the District Council. One of these appointments is also Leader of the District Council and sits as an Observer on the Board of the East Cambs Trading Company and she is a member of the Combined Authority. The role of Observer is not limited to observing at the meetings – they speak at the meetings and steer matters, such as how the Business Plan should be presented. So, this Councillor leads the District Council which lent over £1m to the Trading Company

to develop the MOD site, is a member of the Combined Authority which lent several million pounds to the Trading Company to develop the MOD site, attends Board meetings of the Trading Company, which sold the houses at a discount to the CLT, is a Trustee of the CLT which is buying the houses at a discount but selling them on at full market value and leads the District Council which is lending the CLT some of the money with which to buy the houses. As your District Councillors, we are deeply concerned about the accountability transparency these and of arrangements.

# CAMBRIDGESHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL UPDATE

Alan Sharp Cambridgeshire County Councillor -Woodditton Division

I would like to thank everyone who voted for me in the County Council elections on 6th May resulting in my election as your County Councillor.

I would like to thank my predecessor, Mathew Shuter, who stood down as your County Councillor after 16 years' service, for all his work for our community and I am sure I will be calling on his experience over the coming months.

I am looking forward to working for residents to give them the service they deserve.

Whilst happy at winning the seat, it was very disappointing that the Conservatives did not win enough seats to maintain overall control of the Council, whilst being by far the largest party in terms of seats. Despite offering to speak to other parties, only Labour engaged in conversation, and we have ended up with a Lib Dem/ Labour, Independent coalition, which whilst it is what democracy has dealt us, it is not what residents voted for.

Our group will hold the coalition to account on decisions that they make, and they have already, in our opinion, made a major error in merging the Health committee with the Adults committee, which will devalue the statutory scrutiny of local health services by the County Council and appears to totally ignore the younger population, who have faced many pressures during the Covid-19 pandemic.

# An introduction - Here to help

We are Revds Rosemary & Andrew Rycraft. We live in Newmarket, and have both retired relatively recently from parish ministry in the area (Rosemary at Gazeley, and Andrew at Exning),

Just before we say how we feel able to help during this difficult time for your parishes we thought a very short overview of our lives might be helpful.

Andrew was formerly a Chartered Surveyor, working both in the private and public sectors, with a particular interest in farms and rural properties. Rosemary was a Nurse, trained in the Army in the Queen Alexandra Nursing Corps, and later as a Midwifery Sister working at Mill Road Maternity Hospital in Cambridge. After marrying, Rosemary became a full time Mum with other part time jobs helping in Schools and our Local Church in Oxford.

We lived in Cambridge when we were first married. then in Bedford for 10 years, where our two children were born. Then we moved to Oxford, and after Ordination we took on separate posts in Aylesbury and Charlton on Otmoor. About 9 years ago, Rosemary came back to East Anglia as a Vicar based at Beck Row. Andrew followed 3 years later taking up a post as Vicar at Exning (retiring in 2018). Rosemary then took on the Gazeley Group of Churches, and retired last year.
