

### KINGSWAY SOLAR COMMUNITY ACTION

Following our AGM in April 2025, we're pleased to report a rise in membership—reflecting the growing concern within our community.

To keep everyone informed and connected, we've launched a members' WhatsApp Announcements Channel to complement our regular updates on Facebook and it allows us to share important information quickly and directly.

### Recent developments in Weston Colville

Several residents in Weston Colville have contacted us after receiving letters from agents acting on behalf of the Kingsway Solar project. Where appropriate, we have encouraged landowners to consider granting access, especially when it supports informed decision-making for ecological surveys.

However, we are also aware that certain residents have been issued with a Notice under Section 172, compelling access to their land. This has understandably caused concern. These issues have been raised with local planning and with Pippa Heylings, and we are awaiting further clarification and guidance. We will continue to monitor the situation closely and provide updates as more information becomes available. If you've received similar correspondence or have concerns, please get in touch—we're currently gathering all related information.



Step into Nature: June's Call to Action - Butterflies! Thank you to everyone who's taken part in our Step into Nature campaign so far. For June, we're asking you to look out for butterflies, which are important indicators of a healthy environment.

Please keep recording your sightings—especially anything unusual, rare, or protected. You can log them via iRecord to help us gather vital data within a 2km radius of the proposed Kingsway Solar site. Let's keep showing how much our local wildlife matters!

### SPRING REPORT FROM CHARLOTTE CANE MP

It's hard to believe, but it's now been over ten months since I was elected as your Member of Parliament and what an honour it continues to be. I'm delighted to have spent that time fighting as your local champion and standing up for our communities in Parliament. My team and I have now closed over 4,300 cases—each one representing someone who reached out for help, advice or support. Every case matters, and I remain committed to making sure your voice is heard and your concerns are taken seriously. Healthcare continues to be one of my top priorities. I recently spoke in Parliament about the challenges facing the NHS, including how hard it is for people to see a GP or dentist, and the difficulties local practices face in getting the resources they need. While we don't have a major hospital in Ely and East Cambridgeshire, we rely on others nearby—and it's vital that our own Princess of Wales Hospital is properly maintained. I've spoken with some of our local pharmacists, who are under huge financial pressure, and I've called on the government to give them the support they need and stop the wave of pharmacy closures affecting so many communities. I'm also pressing the government for greater investment in rural public transport. Too many of our villages have no bus service at all, while others have infrequent services and nothing on Sundays. Our rural communities are fantastic places to live—but they must be accessible for everyone.

With proposals for large-scale battery storage sites across our constituency, I'm concerned that current fire safety regulations don't do enough to protect residents or the environment. These sites are crucial for supporting renewable energy—but safety must come first. I've raised the issue in Parliament and written to the Secretary of State, but so far there has been no satisfactory response. That's why I've launched a public petition calling on the Government to urgently strengthen safety regulations for large-scale battery storage sites, including requiring local fire services to be consulted during planning stages. It is possible the petition here: to sign bit.ly/batterystoragesafety

This spring I enjoyed visiting many local events and villages in the area, and I've hosted Community Meetings with residents and councillors in Waterbeach, Sutton, Soham and Ely. The next is in Cheveley on 7<sup>th</sup> June —get in touch to book your place.

### DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

Because of pre-election period restrictions due to the imminent County Council elections, there was no significant activity by the Council since the last report. ECDC remains evenly balanced with fourteen each of Conservatives and the Lib Dem & Independent Group.

### Sanctuary Housing

Members have had a seminar from Sanctuary Housing, and it was reported that many more houses have been renovated and now, occupied. If any one is aware of unoccupied Sanctuary Houses, please let us know so that we can check with Sanctuary. Sometimes major renovations must be done after a tenant leaves a house, particularly when they have been in residence for a long time.

### Community Policing

Members have also had a seminar with the Police about Community policing, and John is discussing with the Area Police sergeant some of the problems that villages in this ward are facing. Please direct any further concerns or matters about policing to John.

## CAMBRIDGESHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

This is my last report as your County Councillor, and I am very sad to be leaving that role.

Congratulations to my successor and I wish him well, as he grapples with the various issues that will face him.

Sadly, a lot of voters voted along national lines, rather than on local issues, but this is the democracy that we have, and I believe passionately in our democracy, even if it kicks you in the teeth from time to time.

I am still your East Cambridgeshire District Councillor and a senior member of the ruling administration of ECDC, so will have a lot of work to do on behalf of residents.

I summarise the events that have happened over the last year.

### Highways

### Capital Maintenance of roads programme

The County Council has introduced a new system for the major resurfacing works which uses a scoring matrix to assess the roads most in need of major work. That sounds a good idea, but I believe that the scoring matrix is very biased towards urban areas, leaving an unlevel playing field.

The normal pothole repairs come out of the revenue budget, but there needs to be better workmanship on those repairs than currently is the case.

The resurfacing work along Bradley Road from Burrough Green is a result of this scoring system, so

it has helped on that road. However, Bradley Road was in such a mess that it needed urgent work, which I have been trying to get for many months.

### Brinkley/ Six Mile Bottom Junction

Working with Brinkley Parish Council, I obtained funding to improve the junction in Brinkley that has seen a number of collisions.

We won a bid to the Local Highways Improvement scheme of County Council and improved signage will be installed, reminding drivers of the junction layout.

Discussions are ongoing with County Council officers to design the road layout are ongoing.

### Kingsway Solar

The application is in totally the wrong position, and I will continue to push for a decision that thinks about residents rather than those of opportunistic applicants.

### **ECDC** Waste Services

The system of collection will change from April 2026 to a four-bin system of different sizes.

Part of this has been determined by Government legislation, which demands that general waste is put in a bin, rather than the bag system that ECDC uses and the weekly collection of food waste, which currently goes into the green bin.

More details will be shared of these changes later in the year to prepare residents.

### Council Tax - Nil Increase

For the eleventh year running, the ECDC portion of the Council tax bill has been frozen, and this is managed with no external borrowing, which is a testament to the way that the Council's finances are managed.

### COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

I am delighted to have been elected to represent the residents of the Woodditton Division and really look forward to supporting this diverse set of communities, from Lode in the northwest to Kirtling & Upend in the southeast.

Firstly, a huge thank you to Alan Sharp, for 4 years working hard as your county councillor. There are so many that will appreciate everything he has done to support them. He is still around as your District Councillor and will continue to work hard for you in that role.

I have met many residents over the past few months and look forward to meeting more of you moving forward. I am very approachable, so please do stop me for a chat if you see me in the village.

### Quality of Life survey

The County Council's third annual countywide Quality of Life survey has launched this month. It will help the council understand and track residents' views across Cambridgeshire.

The survey asks residents about their views on topics such as life and community, transport, health and wellbeing, children and young people, and the council and its services.

The information gathered will inform the council's Business Plan and Budget processes. This year there are two questions to help introduce the concept of Local Government Reorganisation to residents and provide an early indication of awareness.

Even if you are not one of the 1,100 people in this district contacted by the market research company, I would like to encourage as many responses as possible from our area to still take part. The survey is available at <a href="https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/quality-of-life-survey">www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/quality-of-life-survey</a> until Monday 21st July. The responses will then be collated and published to councillors and the public in the autumn.

#### Buses

From 27 May, the Tiger Bus Network will be delivering two new services. Though unfortunately these do not directly support our immediate area, they will provide some onward options from Newmarket.

### Highways

Some work was recently undertaken on Bradley Road in Burrough Green. There is also some scheduled resurfacing work to Station Road in Dullingham on 27<sup>th</sup> May after the bank holiday.

I have recently been selected for the Highways committee at council and will use this position to better understand how we can get better outcomes for the worst bits of road in our area, such as the B1061 leaving Dullingham towards Newmarket. I will also work with local parish councils to help resolve concerns about speed and the safety pf junctions.

## Safety reminder as charging batteries cause several fires

Charging batteries have already caused several fires in homes across the county so far this year.

Firefighters have been called to fires involving batteries being over charged, resulting in thermal runaway from the lithium-ion contained in them and causing significant damage to people's homes.

Crews from Wisbech and March, along with crews from Norfolk, recently attended a well-developed house fire in Wisbech. They arrived to find the battery from a DIY home conversion e-bike kit had exploded, with the fire spreading throughout the property causing significant damage. One of the residents was treated for burns at the scene.

At the start of April crews from Cambridge attended a fire on the ground floor of a house in the Chesterton area of the city. They arrived to find an e-scooter, as well as several other items including power tools, on charge in the living room, with one of the batteries having exploded. Luckily the residents closed the doors while evacuating the property, which limited the damage.

At the end of March crews from Ely and Burwell, along with Newmarket from neighbouring Suffolk, attended a fire in Soham. They arrived to find a fire in the kitchen resulting from two devices being charged, a games console controller and a portable power bank.

A matter of days later the Peterborough Volunteer Fire Brigade and a crew from Yaxley attended a fire in Orton Malborne in Peterborough. This again involved a battery used in a DIY home conversion e-bike kit, bought in an online market place. One of the residents sustained burns that required hospital treatment.

Both of these fires caused significant damage to the properties.

Station Commander Gareth Boyd, one of the Service's community risk managers, said: "These incidents highlight the potential risks that lithium-ion batteries can pose and how it is vital for people to be alert when charging any kind of device. Last year firefighters attended around 20 fires involving batteries charging in homes, with more occurring already in 2025.

"Electrical devices are a key part to everyday life for most people. Mobile phones, tablets, laptops and games console controllers, as well as vehicles like e-bikes and scooters are used daily and need to be powered to do so.

"Most devices come with safety features to ensure they do not overheat when being charged. Using the charging packs, cables and plugs provided by the manufacturers, rather than cheaper versions will help charge devices safely. Replica replacement chargers sometimes don't have these features and can end up overcharging the battery, which causes thermal runaway leading to explosions and rapidly intense fires."

"We have seen items for sale, at car boot sales as well as online, that people can use to convert a standard bike into an e-bike. These whilst seemingly a cheap alternative can be highly dangerous and do not conform to the required standards to be sold in the UK."

<u>Take Charge and Be Safe</u>, remembering some simple tips to help keep you and your families safe.

Most new items come with a suitable battery and charger, however if you are looking to purchase additional ones then make sure they are the right voltage and are fully compatible. Other things like charging a mobile phone while you are awake and alert, rather than while sleeping, means the device won't be overcharged and risk overheating the battery. This can be the same for any device.

The Service is encouraging people to plan a good bedtime routine. Things like making sure all internal doors are closed, electrical sockets are switched off, any candles or heating appliances are off and keeping hallways and stairs clear of obstructions. This will not only help prevent a fire from happening but also ensure an easy escape if one does.

Gareth said: "Many fires in the home start at night while people are asleep. This can be down to a number of different causes but can be easily avoided by following a few simple tips, as well as having working smoke alarms on each floor of your home. A bedtime routine is a great way to help you and your family stay fire safe in your home. By following a few simple tips before heading to bed for the night, you can prevent a fire from happening or, if one does break out, stop it from spreading."

Residents can also use our online home safety check to carry out their own fire risk assessment of their home. This simple to use tool goes through each area of a property and generates a safety plan for the occupants to follow. The check can be carried out on behalf of a vulnerable family member.
