Motorists are urged to take care when parking their vehicles so they do not prevent our fire engines from attending potentially life-threatening emergencies. There are some areas around the county that are notorious for motorists parking down both sides of a narrow street and there have been times when fire engines haven't been able to get past at all. This of course can cause us a significant delay in responding to emergencies where someone's life could be at risk and our attendance time is crucial.

This is a growing problem due in part to increasing car ownership, reduced or unused resident parking areas, traffic calming schemes and thoughtless parking by some motorists. The problem can be compounded at night and during the school pick-up and drop-off times.

The average fire engine is 2.6 metres (nine feet) wide and 8 metres (26 feet) long - when you park your vehicle in a narrow street, always check you have left enough room for a fire engine to get past. UPDATE FROM BURROUGH GREEN PARISH COUNCIL

Thank you to those who joined our January meeting, and especially to Paul for volunteering to join the Council. Here are the highlights and recent updates:

Kingsway Solar Farm – The Council submitted a response to the recent first round of consultations, which expressed our concerns regarding the impact that the development would have.

Speeding - Funding was approved to cover the installation costs for the new MVAS (Mobile Vehicle Activate Sign) on Brinkley Road, Burrough End.

The Parish Council would like thank Paul and Carla for the fabulous ongoing support they provide to Burrough Green. They voluntarily give their time to regularly move the MVAS sign, and to ensure the battery is always charged up. Thank You!

Village Pond - Funding was approved to install the fence at the edge nearest the cricket pavilion, to prevent access and protect a small patch of land for wildlife. We're continuing to look at options for plants, and possibly a new bench.

Maintenance & Footpaths - Various maintenance tasks have been completed on the playpark and book exchange. The Council is investigating the maintenance responsibilities for the footpath along Green Lane.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT MARCH 2025

Finance and Assets Committee on 30 January 2025 At this meeting, the following decisions were made:

1. The first draft of the 2025/26 Budget was discussed. The Director Finance recommended that the District Council Tax should increase by £5 (for a Band D property), but the Conservatives' amendment to have no increase in Council Tax was agreed.

2. The Crematorium project has now moved from RIBA stage 3 to RIBA stage 4, after the original design was value-engineered, and the outcome will be brought to Full Council in May.

3. The draft Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy 2025-2028 was formally adopted.

Local Government re-organisation

The Government has launched a review of Local Government Authorities with a view to improving efficiency. There is little time for constructive consultation and submission to the Government, but there will be a discussion among ECDC members as to what would be of most benefit to our residents. There is ongoing discussion with the other Local Government Authorities in the county. Parish Councils will remain, and may have more voice in local matters. Sunnica

It is not expected that there will be any formal submission of plans until late 2026. ECDC, CCC and West Suffolk DC will be liaising with each other on this matter. Once the plans have been submitted then there will be eight weeks for the Councils to respond. We shall be engaging with communities affected by the infrastructure, and individuals or groups can submit comments by email to: sunnica@eastcambs.gov.uk

The next ward surgery will be at the pavilion on The Denny in Swaffham Bulbeck from half past six to half past seven on Thursday 20 March 2025, followed by a social meeting at The Black Horse in the same village.

NEWS FROM LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE

At Linton Village College we are passionate about our students learning about the world of work and one of the most valuable programmes we afford our pupils is having exposure to future careers and next steps opportunities after their time here at LVC. The 'Future Careers and Pathways' department works hard to ensure students of all year groups are well informed about their future.

In Year 7, students spend a day listening to external speakers from 'Form the Future', a Cambridge consortium that help young people find their route through education into employment. Additionally, 'Form the Future' provides employers with access to their future talent. Students are given talks by a series of professionals in a 'What's my Line' format, guessing what each of the professions might be.

From Years 8 to 10, students enjoy Enterprise Days, Apprenticeship talks and mock interviews. In Year 11, students are carefully guided through the post-16 process, where students choose what their next steps might be.

KINGSWAY SOLAR COMMUNITY ACTION

Chancellor Rachel Reeves recently set out her vision for fast-tracking economic growth, stating, "Focus on getting things built and stop worrying about the bats and the newts." Her speech reinforced the government's push for major infrastructure projects. But at what cost?

Brian Eversham, CEO of the Beds, Cambs, and Northants Wildlife Trust, believes in responsible development—one that doesn't just squeeze wildlife into whatever space is left but actively protects and restores nature.

This is why KCSA is standing against large-scale solar developments that threaten our rural landscapes and wildlife. We support renewable energy but believe there's a better way. In the coming weeks, you'll see posters raising awareness about the 500 MW Kingsway Solar Farm plus battery storage and its impact on our local footpaths and wildlife. In March, we need your help to record local brown hares. They were left out of the scoping report but should be in the Environmental Impact Assessment.

Meanwhile, the government's much-anticipated Land Use Framework (LUF) has launched with a 12-week consultation period. It aims to balance housing, energy, agriculture and nature—but will it deliver?
