



Reading at home

Reading at home is so important as it supplements the excellent work happening here at Burrough Green. I have been researching into reading and found this quote:

'Less than 15% of children from low-income families who are behind by the age of 7, will go on to achieve 5 good (5+) GCSEs – including maths and English'.

This, and other similar quotes, really bring home the necessity to get reading right from the word go. All our teachers are always available to support and advise parents and children in this area. Please contribute as much as you can to your child's reading education - thank you.

No Outsiders

This week we have had 2 *No Outsiders* lessons - Teresa and Einstein. Both sessions were incredibly well attended, and it was lovely to see so many parents supporting this. The scheme really is making a difference to our children.

Here are a selection of photos from the events.



Big Questions / Global Curriculum.

At Burrough Green, to supplement our curriculum, the children will now access a 'global curriculum'. This is designed to get children to think about those huge issues whether it be access to clean water for all or considering more spiritual questions such as, 'If you have happiness does there have to be sadness?'.

The question for the whole school this term is:

Are electric cars a good thing?

There is already a display up in the atrium outlining the pros and cons of electric cars and there will be assemblies on topic during the term.

The pros and cons of electric cars is easy to Google. AI will even write you a child friendly, age-appropriate script to help.

Our purpose is to get the children to be 'global', to think about issues that are bigger than the area in which they live. We want them to have opinions and to learn to listen to others. Later this school year, oracy will become a whole school focus.

The power of these activities is potentially huge. At Burrough Green we have 'altered' our British Values on the back of such a question - children decided that 'tolerance' is a negative word - we shouldn't tolerate, we should accept. Acceptance now replaces tolerance in all our literature on British Values. From a child, this is beautiful.

That's all from me this month. See you next for our 'run up to Christmas' edition of school life at Burrough Green.

KINGSWAY SOLAR COMMUNITY ACTION

A huge thank you to everyone who came along to our objection workshops and to those who attended the Kingsway Solar presentations to raise your concerns. We're also grateful to everyone who submitted a response to the Stage Two statutory consultation. Our aim was to encourage as many personal and well-informed submissions as possible, and together we achieved just that!

Thank you also for your donations to our GoFundMe campaign, which supported our community activities and helped make our "No Way Kingsway" signs so visible across the villages during the consultation. Your generosity has kept the campaign active and seen.

Community survey results

Our analysis of the community survey (completed by more than 200 residents) formed a key part of KSCA's consultation response. Over 90% of respondents oppose the proposed Kingsway Solar project, with 86% strongly opposed. The top concerns were visual impact on the landscape, loss of productive farmland, and harm to wildlife and nature. Despite this, residents overwhelmingly support renewable energy when delivered in fairer, more sustainable ways, such as rooftop solar, brownfield developments, and community-owned projects rather than large industrial schemes on farmland.

Support the legal fund

Our Crowd Justice campaign is raising funds for the legal challenge. The platform ensures donations only go towards a properly funded case; if a target isn't met, pledges are automatically refunded. This gives every supporter confidence that their contribution will make an impact. Crowd Justice also provides a transparent way to collect small donations securely and track progress publicly. Every pledge, large or small, helps.

Step into Nature

As the seasons change, please keep logging wildlife sightings on iRecord. Your observations of birds, bats, flowers, and hedgerow species are vital evidence of the biodiversity that could be affected by the Kingsway Solar development. Every record counts.

What happens next

Our work continues. KSCA will register as an Interested Party when the Planning Inspectorate opens the next stage. This allows us to contribute formally to the Examination and provide feedback as the proposal is reviewed.

The fight to oppose this industrial solar development is not over, and your continued involvement remains essential.

THE STORY OF THE MAN ON THE M11

It's 1pm on a Saturday; Cambridgeshire Police receive a report that someone's husband is missing. He was last seen when he left his house two hours ago. When his mobile is called the line is muffled and he is heard to say 'I'm on the motorway' before the phone cuts out. People have been out searching for him, but with no luck, and the tracker set up on his phone as an added safety measure isn't working!

This was the reality for one woman in a small South Cambs village recently, who told the police call handler that her husband is in his 80s and suffers from dementia. Usually when he leaves home he returns safely - but not today. Less than 10 minutes later, the police get a second call from a motorist saying he'd spotted a man who looked very disorientated and confused walking on the hard shoulder of the M11, near junction 10 at Duxford. Police officers visited the area and found the man safe and well, 22 minutes after the initial call. They then took him home and reunited him with his worried wife. They also took the time to fix the tracking app on the man's phone, and told his wife all about two new ways to help keep people living with dementia in Cambridgeshire safe.

This included the new Herbert Protocol form which can be filled out online - and encourages family and friends to collate key info such as a physical description, familiar places, health details and a recent photo of a loved one with dementia that will help officers if they go missing. More than 135 people have already done the same.

The police have also handed out hundreds of new yellow wristbands, like a watch in appearance, to the most vulnerable members of our community living with dementia. The wristbands contain the person's next of kin's contact details and number.

If you see someone looking confused or disorientated but wearing one of these wristbands, you can use your phone to easily bring up the information and reunite



person with their family possibly without the need call police.

There are more than 10,000 people living in Cambridgeshire with dementia. To register your interest for one of the new wristbands, watch a quick video on how to scan one, or fill out our new Herbert Protocol form for loved www.cambs.police.uk/advice/advice-and-



Take Charge and Be Safe this festive season

As the festive season approaches and people look for presents and take advantage of Black Friday deals, many are looking to save money on electrical items. However, we continue to urge people to Take Charge and Be Safe when buying devices, especially items that require batteries or chargers.

You can help keep yourself and your family safe by following a few simple safety measures, including ensuring to buy electrical items from reputable dealers, being awake and at home when using and charging devices and adding safety to your bedtime routine.

Electrical devices are a key part of everyday life and are often bought in Black Friday deals and as presents for family members and friends. Games consoles with controllers, tablets, laptops and e-bikes and e-scooters are on lots of people's present list. All these items require charging as they contain lithium-ion batteries.

Most devices come with failsafe features to ensure they do not overheat when being charged but rely on the manufacturers' provided charging cables and adapters to work. Also, using the plug and cables supplied with the product rather than cheaper versions will help charge devices safely.

The Service is reminding people to Take Charge and Be Safe, not only when charging their devices, but also when planning to purchase devices and presents. Most new items come with a suitable battery and charger, however if you are looking to purchase additional ones then make sure, they are the right voltage and are fully compatible. Other things like charging a mobile phone while you are awake and alert, rather than while sleeping, means the device won't be overcharged and risk overheating the battery. This can be the same for any device.

We are encouraging people to plan a good bedtime routine including things like making sure electrical sockets are switched off, all internal doors are closed, any candles are out, heating appliances are off and hallways and stairs are kept clear of obstructions. This will not only help prevent a fire from happening but also ensure an easy escape if one does.

Disposing of batteries safely

Batteries can be a fire hazard if they are not disposed of properly. They should never be put in household rubbish or recycling bins.

During the processing of waste or recycling, a battery can be compacted and damaged, which can lead to ignition of the highly reactive lithium, leading to a fire starting.

Any kind of battery can cause a fire if not disposed of correctly and safely. This includes vapes or other ecigarettes as well as standard batteries.

Fires involving batteries cause damage to refuse vehicles and roads, as well as significant delays to bin collections and road closures.

How to dispose of batteries

There are many places to safely dispose of batteries. As well as local recycling centres, many shops around the county have collection bins in-store.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

We step ever closer to councils agreeing which proposals to submit for the government to consider for the local government reorganisation of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough on 28th November. Each council is only able to recommend one proposal and then the government will decide and consult on how they want to proceed early next year.

The County Council continues to support the submission of Option A, which combines East and South Cambridgeshire with the City. Many local councillors, our parishes and I though not content with the process we've been pushed into, also support this option as the only one viable for our area. We're working together to submit a joint statement directly to government ministers to make clear how disadvantaged this area will become if aligned with Peterborough rather than Cambridge; as well as sharing our disappointment that this process has not been able to address Newmarket's relationship to many of our daily lives.

QUALITY OF LIFE SURVEY 2025

The results of the County Council's third annual Quality of Life survey have now been published.

Happiness is at its highest point since tracking began (84%), but loneliness (30%) and mental health struggles (28%) remain high, particularly with younger age groups.

Residents remain concerned about the cost of living and jobs and investment, with 87% of residents reporting they personally feel concerned. Just under two thirds (62%) also report concern over the level of investment and jobs in their local area. This has been steadily increasing year on year.

A sense of community and pride of place continues to be strong. Residents continue to feel safe in (85%) and have a sense of belonging to (76%) their local communities. Around half (48%) of residents are involved in their local community in some way.

Residents' views on Cambridgeshire County Council's performance are also the most positive they've been. Residents continue to trust the Council to make decisions (52%) and deliver value for money (47%). This is higher than national averages.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

The political leadership of East Cambridgeshire District Council has now launched a campaign in favour of Option B, with East Cambridgeshire along with Huntingdonshire and Fenland being run from Peterborough. Neither Peterborough nor Huntingdonshire is supporting this option.

If you believe, like I do, that Option B will be deeply damaging to East Cambridgeshire to cut off our influence over the places where we work, study, and receive health care, and to be run from a city miles away with which most of us have no connection, please respond to their survey at

A long Full Council meeting on 18 September.

- New Homes Ombudsman: the Lib Dems proposed that the Council should require its Trading Company to join the scheme which gives people moving into new build homes the right to take complaints to the New Homes Ombudsman. This was rejected by the Conservatives, on the grounds that it wasn't compulsory, and that the Trading Company had joined inferior scheme, which didn't give access to the Ombudsman.
- Ely junction: the proposal that the Council should continue to press the Government to invest in upgrades to the rail network north of Ely, to open it up to more rail journeys for passengers and freight was passed.
- It was pointed out that four years ago, the Conservative group had promised an army of uniformed volunteer traffic wardens that has now shrunk to, possibly, part-funding one PCSO; the illegal and inconvenient parking continues in the villages and Ely.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE RETIREMENT AND REPLACEMENT

East Cambridgeshire District Council Chief Executive John Hill will be retiring at the end of this year, and the Council has set in motion plans to fill the vacancy. Of the three members of the recruitment panel, two are Conservative despite both groups being equal on the council.

STREAMLINING INFRASTRUCTURE PLANNING

The Government is consulting on removing the requirement for statutory consultation as part of the process for determining large national infrastructure projects such as the solar farm at Sunnica, or the incinerator at Wisbech. This proposal is set out in Government's Planning and Infrastructure Bill.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

A Missed Opportunity

Lib Dems on the Council's Finance & Assets Committee voted against plans to hand over £72,000 of affordable housing funds to East Cambs District Council's own company, East Cambs Trading Company, for use at Arbour Square Ely. The money came from developer contributions that must be used to create extra affordable housing. However, ECTC had already signed binding contracts to deliver all twenty-seven houses on this site as affordable housing for social rent.

Lib Dem Councillors said this means the grant does not secure a single additional house—it simply gives taxpayers' money back to a Council-owned company that has already committed to deliver the scheme. Local residents in housing need are being denied the extra houses this money should have provided.

OPERATIONAL SERVICES COMMITTEE

- The Council's recycling rate is lower for the last two quarters than the equivalent periods a year ago.
- The Council has admitted that on most days the street cleaning service operates below the minimum number of staff.
- It was noted that residents had received letters about the forthcoming changes to the waste collection service, and that there will be follow-up communications.

POLICE SURVEY

<u>DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT</u> - Woodditton Ward HIGHWAYS

The repairs to the B1061 on the hill coming out of Dullingham have been delayed again. The work is now promised for the end of November 2025.

There has been a large amount of neglect of highways, and it is interesting that last month the County Councillor talked about resolving the issues of neglect, when it has been his group in power for over four years, during which time they have reduced budgets and opposed budget amendments made each year by the Conservative group to increase the spend on highways.

I will continue to hod the administration to account. If there is any work that you believe requires work, please contact me and I will raise this with Highways and aim to get it done.

COUNCIL REORGANISATION (Eds notes : See other Councillors reports for more details)

The response to the Government's imposed Council reorganisation continues to develop.

The response to Government stating the final decision from the councils is required by 28th November and East Cambridgeshire District Council will meet on 20th November to decide our response

A lot of the work done is not around the best geographical fit, but financial and operational considerations, due to the heavy debts that some Councils have and the likely funding from Government. East Cambridgeshire District Council has no external borrowing and pride itself on strong financial management, whereas Cambridge City and South Cambs have very large debts, each in excess of £200m.

The whole process now seems to be driven by various political priorities, especially in Peterborough, Cambridge City Council, South Cambs and the County Council.

The solution should be about what is best for delivering quality services to residents.

I will continue to keep you updated, but welcome and feedback or comments.

KINGSWAY SOLAR

The Statutory Consultation has started and will run until 29th October, so please give your views and attend one of the public engagement meetings. It will take prime agricultural land out of food production and will destroy communities. This cannot be right.

WASTE SERVICES

Full details have been sent to every resident, and I will place those details on my Councillor Facebook page, so please visit that. The changes are due to happen on 1st June 2026, so there will be more updates coming out in 2026. If there are any questions on the new waste system, please contact me.

FIRST EXPLORER WITH A DISABILITY TO SKI SOLO AND UNSUPPORTED TO THE SOUTH POLE.

Jonny Huntington, whilst serving as an officer in the British Army in 2014, had a stroke causing complete paralysis from the neck down on his left side. Following extensive rehabilitation and discharge from the Armed Forces, Jonny entered the world of elite sport as a disabled athlete, competing for Great Britain as a para cross-country skier.

In November 2024, Jonny embarked on his greatest challenge yet. Over 46 days, Jonny covered 911km of Antarctic tundra, joining a select group of people who have skied to the South Pole without support. He skied for around 11 hours a day, dragging all his equipment and food in a sled weighing more than 100kg whilst battling temperatures as low as -40°C, high winds, crevasses and relentless 24hr daylight.
