





Be water aware

While the sun is shining, it might be tempting to cool down with a dip in local rivers, canals, quarries or lakes. But think twice before you do. There can be hidden dangers beneath the surface that can have deadly consequences.

Every year firefighters are called to incidents where people, both adults and children, get into difficulty when taking a dip in open water.

The water may look calm on the surface, but there may still be strong undercurrents, especially near locks, that could pull even the strongest swimmer under. There can also be rubbish, like shopping trolleys and rubble hidden beneath the murky water that you could become trapped in. There is often broken glass on the river bed and cuts from this can sometimes lead to deadly infections.

The water may feel relatively warm on the surface, but just a few inches below can be icy cold, even on hot days. This can cause panic and 'cold water shock', meaning the water can be so cold it takes your breath away and makes swimming extremely difficult.

If you find yourself in cold water do not panic, float on your back. If you float on your back and don't struggle, your clothes will have some air in them that will help you float more easily. After 60 to 90 seconds the cold water shock will pass and you will be able to breathe normally again so that you can swim to safety. We are urging people to be aware of these dangers when around open water and for parents to have this conversation with their children.

If you see someone in trouble in water:

- Do not hesitate call 999 immediately with clear details of your location. Request fire service if inland.
- Try to reach out to them with a stick or belt, keeping low so you do not get pulled into the water yourself.
- Send someone to the nearest road to flag down the emergency services when they arrive and direct them to the incident.
- Find the nearest life ring and throw it to the person. If a life ring is not available, throw in anything that could help them float.
- If someone goes under the water, mark on the water's edge the place they were last seen with something like a piece of clothing.
- Download the free what3words app so that emergency services can help pinpoint your location in hard to find areas.

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is looking to recruit more on-call firefighters to help serve local communities across the county.

On-call firefighters are a vital part of our Service and community. They respond to a wide range of incidents, from fighting fires, attending road traffic collisions, animal rescues to supporting other emergency services. In addition to responding to emergency incidents, our on-call firefighters support their communities by providing information and advice on a range of community safety topics.

They receive an annual wage to reflect the time they commit to being available plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights (one evening a week for two hours).

It's a hugely rewarding role, and we hope to encourage members of the community from all backgrounds to get in touch and find out more about becoming an on-call firefighter.

Last week I met with Parish Councillors and County Councillor Alan Sharp to discuss these concerns around speeding and road safety in the Burrough Green parish. I am pleased that, following the meeting, the police have agreed to come to the village to carry out some speed enforcement checks. In addition, I have agreed that I will support any LHI bid put in by the Parish Council to reduce the speed limit at Burrough End - which would be submitted in the autumn.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL UPDATE

Alan Sharp Cambridgeshire County Councillor - Woodditton Division

We are in the summer period for Local Authorities, so meetings are not normally held in this period.

However, I have a few items since the last report.

The County Council met on 20th July, and it is sad to report that the current administration reneged on the previous Conservative County Council's decision to downgrade the A1123 in the centre of the District to a B road, which would have helped to take traffic off this road. The pressure to get an acceptable solution for residents will continue.

Speeding through rural villages and along rural roads is an issue that causes concern to many residents. I have been working with parishes in my division to get bids accepted for road calming measures and will continue to do so.

However, the speed in the villages is only part of the issue, as coming upon the aftermath of an accident on the B1061 earlier this month, excess speed along rural roads is a massive concern. I am working with Highways on improving visibility at that junction.

My County Division covers 11 villages, as well as a large part of Newmarket, and in all those communities, excess speed is an issue. I will continue to work to get a resolution to each of the different issues.

Everyone should remember that the speed limit is not a target, but a maximum.

I am due to have a meeting with the A1102 group shortly, who are concerned about some of the proposals of the Greater Cambridge Partnership, which could affect residents who travel into Cambridge along Newmarket Road. This is an ongoing issue, and I will keep residents informed and updated on all the issues.

I received a call from a resident recently about scam messages that they had received, and they were very alarmed by the incident. These messages and phone calls are unfortunately a problem of life currently. This resident thought that they were being targeted personally and asked how have they got my number, as I am ex-directory. The criminals operating these scams are using random numbers to call and very rarely do they have any personal details of you. That is what they are trying to obtain.

If you receive such messages/calls, do not give out any personal details.

Seek support from neighbours/friends and if you are really concerned, from the police. Please call me if you need guidance on who to seek advice from.

Most importantly stay safe.

I look forward to updating residents further next month.

Like the County Council, there have been no meetings in August.

Full Council

At the latest Full Council meeting of the District Council on 15th July, the Council agreed with the Boundary Commission proposal for the new parliamentary constituency to consist of the whole of East Cambridgeshire District together with Waterbeach and Milton. Currently the South East Cambridgeshire constituency excludes the northern half of the District, but includes more villages from South Cambridgeshire. To have the whole of the District within the proposed new constituency seems to be a good proposal.

There is the local authority boundary issue and the arbitrary boundary, where over 800 homes are in Cambridgeshire, but physically part of Newmarket. Those residents are represented by your County and District Councillors but removing the boundary and making it all part of Cambridgeshire would help local democracy.

Please let us know your views on this issue, as this is an important issue, that needs to be addressed in the foreseeable future.

Charlotte Cane - East Cambs Bottisham Ward

Thank you to everyone who responded to the District Council's public consultation on cycle ways and footpaths which started before the Covid lockdown. Following this consultation, the District Council is working with the County Council to improve cycle ways and footpaths. East Cambs is paying for feasibility studies for cycle routes across the District, in order to support bids to the County Council for funding. One of the routes being considered is Swaffham Prior-Reach-Burwell. As well as looking at new routes, East Cambs are asking Parish Councils to comment on the condition of existing cycle ways and footpaths.

We are working with Parish, District and County Councillors from Bottisham, Great Wilbraham, Little Wilbraham/Six Mile Bottom and Fulbourn to consider a cycle route between Bottisham and the Wilbrahams. The current suggestion is to utilise the wide verge (ca. 2metres, owned by the County council) on the road from the A1303 past the air museum and across the A14 bridge to the Wilbraham Road to form a cycle path alongside the highway. To provide a full active travel route, this path would need to be linked to a crossing of the A1303, repairs to the footpath between High Street and Bell Road Bottisham (in need of repair in any case, whether or not there is a cycle path), and Sheffield cycle stands at the bus stop for the No. 12 bus.

East Cambs has created an Audit Committee, of which Charlotte is a member. This committee considers the findings of Internal and External auditors, the Annual Governance Statement and the Risk Register. Charlotte requested that several senior officers attend the Committee to answer questions about their areas of responsibility. Unfortunately, the Chief Executive decided that it was not appropriate for most of these officers to attend. As a consequence, many of the questions raised at the Committee were not answered on the day and we were promised answers after the meeting. The meeting was held on 26 July and as at the time of writing (14 August) no replies have been provided.

One of the queries was why officers considered the risk of "Loss of... access to ICT systems due to ... or weaknesses in the IT infrastructure" to be "unlikely" given that the Council's email service had been down for over 48 hours on two separate occasions this year already. We warned that the explanation given for the most recent failure suggested there would be another failure in the near future. Although we didn't get answers about what was being done to avoid further failures, we did get agreement that Internal Audit would bring forward their planned review of the IT infrastructure and business continuity arrangements. Unfortunately, a few days later the email system went down again. It is now back up, but it is not clear how stable it is and whether any emails have been lost on the interim. This illustrates the importance of an honest assessment of risks, so that management can concentrate resources on avoiding the highest risks.

The Harvest Is Safely Gathered In

At least I hope it will by the time you read this newsletter |

In years gone by, when a high proportion of the population of these villages were working in various capacities on the land, harvest was an important time, not only of the agricultural year, but of the whole cycle of seasons for everyone. When the corn was ripe for harvesting, it was a question of 'all hands to the pumps'. A remaining legacy of which is that the school holidays still span the month of August, when in those days most of the harvest would be gathered in, with children helping to providing the extra hands when the whole operation relied largely on physical labour.

The mixed and uncertain weather has made this a difficult year for farmers. Drilling in the Autumn was delayed because of the wet conditions, resulting in more Spring planted crops and the last few months have seen all extremes of weather from drought to flood. Nevertheless, I understand that some farmers have been pleasantly surprised by yields this harvest. Church Harvest Festival Services have long been an opportunity for parishioners to give thanks for the harvest, and to show this by bringing offerings of

fresh produce along to Church, which can then be offered to those less fortunate in the area.

The tradition of celebrating the Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843 when, at Morwenstow in Cornwall, Revd Robert Hawker conducted a special thanksgiving service at his church and blessed the crops. A year later, Revd Henry Alford's hymn, 'Come, ye thankful people, come, raise the song of harvesthome!' was published and soon became a regular favourite.

There is still much to celebrate at this time of the year. You may have noticed that, regardless of all we have gone through in the last eighteen months because of the Covid pandemic, the beauty and abundance of God's creation has 'blossomed' - totally unaffected by the virus that has changed our lives possibly forever.

We are fortunate to live in a country with four distinct seasons. Despite the apparent effects of climate change on our weather, in the words of the popular Harvest hymn 'We plough the fields and scatter'— God still provides 'the warmth to swell the grain, the breezes and the sunshine, and soft refreshing rain'.

We must hope and pray that the international cooperation at the forthcoming Climate Change Conference (COP26) in Glasgow, starting at the end of next month, will produce proposals to counteract the human activity that is causing the climate to change, thus ensuring that our farmers will continue to reap abundant harvests in the years to come.
